LIQUOR MANAGEMENT POLICY

The Board of Governors encourages the membership and their guests to enjoy our congenial atmosphere while also acting responsibly in consuming alcoholic beverages. Overuse of spirits can lead to intoxication, a major cause of personal injuries and death. It is our mutual desire to prevent our members and guests from consuming alcoholic beverages to excess, because we value each other, our property and want everyone to both return home safely and come again.

The Tunxis Club does not and will not serve alcoholic beverages.

Members may bring to Club social events, or store in their secured, personal lockers at the Clubhouse, alcoholic beverages for exclusive, private service by them to themselves, fellow members or guests. The House Manager, in his normal daily rounds relative to Clubhouse security, will assure that bar lockers are either secure or made empty.

Club employees will not personally serve a member's or guest's private stock of alcoholic beverages to them or to any other member or guest. An employee may accept private, paid employment to bartend for a member at the member's camp without violating this policy. A member may hire a bartender to serve at a private party at the Clubhouse, but no Club employee may be so employed there.

Club sponsored social events at which private alcohol consumption is probable will include the scheduled service of a meal usually not later than one hour after the beginning of the event. Coffee will be available at all such functions.

Non-alcoholic alternative beverages, in addition to those commonly thought of as "set ups", will always be available at the Clubhouse for purchase through the House Manager or already included in the cost of the particular social event.

A copy of this policy will be posted at the Clubhouse and provided to every Club employee.

All members, guests and employees share equally in the obligation to act responsibly and assertively in teamwork to assure the environment envisioned by the first paragraph of this Club liquor management policy. Be alert to the common signs of excess, remember the absorption retarding affect of food, help arrange alternative transportation if needed, remember that the legal drinking age is 21 and call for outside help if it makes sense.
